Holiday Cookies for Dogs



The holiday season is all about indulging— parties, family gatherings, and delicious treats are everywhere. So, why not let our furry friends join in on the festive fun with a little treat of their own? Treat your pup to some indulgence with healthy homemade dog treats packed with sweet potato, peanut butter, whole oats, and a dash of cinnamon.

Ingredients:

2 cups fresh sweet potato puree; 1 egg; 1/2 cup oats;
3 cups whole wheat flour; 3 Tbsp of all natural peanut butter; 1/2 tsp cinnamon

Instructions:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
- Peel and cube two medium sweet potatoes and bring to a boil. Reduce to low and simmer approx 15-20 minutes or until soft. Drain potatoes and puree them.
- In small bowl, stir together the flour, oats, and cinnamon.

- In a separate large bowl, whisk together the egg, sweet potato and peanut butter until combined. Stir wet ingredients into dry.
- Pour onto a floured surface and roll dough out to 1/4 -3/8 thick. Cut out using Christmas cookie cutter. The dough will be a little sticky, dust your hands and the rolling pin with a little flour to help!
- Bake for 30 to 35 minutes until golden brown.
- Place on cooling racks and let cool thoroughly. They will harden as they cool.

Serve and watch the tails wag!!
